This May 18th, we hope you will join us in addressing the root causes of animal homelessness in our area. Whether it's to provide food and supplies for companion animals in need, or to combat overpopulation through spaying and neutering, even the smallest donation makes a difference in the life of animals.

## LAA Shoe Drive

LAA has undertaken a shoe drive to collect used and new shoes between April 1 and June 1, 2017. We are working on this through Funds2orgs, who takes the shoes that we collect and delivers them to micro-enterprises in developing countries like Haiti, Honduras, Bolivia and several others.

### How does this help animals you ask?

LAA gets paid for the shoes that we collect. Our goal is to collect 2,500 pair of shoes. If we do, LAA will get a check for \$1000 from Funds2orgs. If we collect more than 2,500, we get an even larger donation! That will pay for a lot of spay and neuter procedures, or buy a lot of cat or dog food!

We are looking for shoes that you are no longer using or you won't ever wear again. Kid's shoes, women's shoes, men's shoes, boots, slippers, sandals and flip flops. Our only limitation is that they cannot have holes in the toes and the soles must still be attached.

**Another benefit...** it keeps millions of shoes out of landfills!

## Featured Rescue: Hearts United for Animals



On March 4, 2017, Boo was adopted. Staff and volunteers rejoiced at Boo's good fortune. She is an 11-year-old puppy mill dog who had been at the HUA shelter for three years.

There are numerous elderly puppy mill dogs like Boo that call the HUA shelter home because HUA leaves no dog behind in a puppy mill. Old, ill, terrified—they all come here. Special diets and medicine check-off sheets are the order of the day for caregivers, and dozens of volunteers arrive faithfully to give loving attention.

Every day begins early at the HUA shelter, a 65-acre campus located between Nebraska City and Auburn. Caregivers arrive to tend the needs of 350 to 400 dogs and cats who all want human attention and reassurance of how important they are. Six animal resident buildings, a spay/neuter clinic, and two on-site foster homes provide the setting for giving comfort, safety, and freedom for all sizes and ages of animals.

HUA began twenty-eight years ago with the mission of saving homeless animals. The county of the shelter's location and many surrounding counties have no accommodations for animals. For an abandoned dog, a litter of puppies or kittens set out to die, there can be no turning away. The numbers are monumental.

HUA is a no-kill rescue and adoption charity devoted to giving the best possible outcome for each individual animal. Ninety percent of income is spent on veterinary care, caregiver payroll, animal food and supplies, utilities, and property

maintenance. Administrators are dedicated volunteers.

In 1996 two HUA volunteers attended a puppy mill auction in Kansas and purchased the freedom of seventeen breeder dogs. That was the horrible eyewitness introduction to the mass producing commercial dog breeding business. Since that time thousands of puppy mill dogs have come to the HUA shelter. Many of these precious little animals are so damaged that they never recover. Reaching the puppy-buying public and government agencies with information is a non-stop mission.

Over the years other programs of mercy have developed—giving refuge to pets of families leaving their homes to escape domestic violence, providing assistance to families unable to pay veterinary costs for their suffering pets, maintaining a food bank for needy pets. A major program that began in October, 2003, is the HUA Low-Cost Spay/Neuter Clinic. Our mentor and benefactor was the late Dorothy E. Bush of Lincoln. Fourteen years later, clinic patients total 15,973 preventing untold numbers of suffering puppies and kittens. The clinic is operated according to the high professional standards of our animal welfare veterinarian, Dr. James Gigstad of Nebraska City.

In the year 1989, HUA began with a handful of devoted volunteers. Thousands of people across the continent have joined our mission of mercy. The growth of HUA speaks volumes about the dedication of people who care about the suffering of animals.

## Volunteer Spotlight: Paula Einemann

Over time, I have owned five dogs: a golden retriever, a black lab, two Bichons, and a small poodle mix. Currently we have Jasmine (Bichon) and Simon (small poodle mix). Pictured in the photo with me is Truman, who joined all the angel dogs on September 30, 2016.



I am retired, and enjoy not having to stick with a rigid schedule, especially in the morning hours and after dinner. My new mantras are “Don’t Rush Me” and “I’m on Break!” I am one of these people who doesn’t like serving on a committee or any planning/organizing. I just like to show up! This leaves me plenty of time to read, which I never had time for when employed, and to walk my dogs, see girlfriends, family and of course movies on Tuesdays.

In addition to giving a few hours to LAA, when I help distribute the newsletters and represent LAA once monthly at the north Petco, I have also helped out somewhat with Sadie Dog Fund, the public school backpack program, Nebraska No Kill Canine Rescue, and the American Red Cross blood Drives. I like donating to Cause for Paws, St. Louise Gift & Thrift, and to the People’s City Mission Homeless Prevention Center. I do a little bit of volunteering for a few charities that I have learned about just by talking to friends and even strangers, or seeing something mentioned on social media.

I am proud of the annual Animal Blessing Service at my church.

My very favorite events to work at are the Spayghetti and No Balls fundraising dinner and sitting at the LAA information table at the Project Homeless Coalition event. I did not have a dog when I was growing up, and so now I feel especially lucky to have a great family, friends, and dogs in my life. It comforts me to know that our two daughters were raised with a companion animal in the house, which began when our youngest was in the 5th grade.

LAA is always looking for volunteers who can help to return voice message left on their phone lines, and I recommend this charity for people like me, who want to help out in the community, and you never even have to leave your favorite chair! Every little bit helps.

# Rescue Starts With Just One Animal

At the age of twenty, Megan Yank rescued one cat. Now eleven years later, she has rescued or rehomed more than 200 cats. That's a lot of lives saved! I recently sat down with her to find out how she got her start, what challenges and successes she's had, and how others can follow her lead.

I wouldn't say I really had a reason for "starting" in rescue. It seems that the cats in need have always found their way to me. My friends joke that I can go just about anywhere and find a homeless cat and my heart breaks for them every time.

When Megan started in animal rescue, she was a college student working a few jobs. One of those jobs was a restaurant and it's where, while taking out the trash, she spotted a little cream-colored kitten standing by the dumpster. "When I saw this little guy, I knew I had to help him. I ran back in the restaurant to find him something to eat, but almost everything was closed and put away for the night so the only thing I could find was some milk. I offered him some and ended up taking him home with me." Because Megan couldn't keep cats where she lived at the time, she found a home for him. She's stayed in contact with his new owner and occasionally pet-sits him.

Megan's love of animals inspired her as a child to dream of becoming a veterinarian. Ironically, that same love for animals also led her to eventually give up that dream, because she couldn't face the daunting task of having to euthanize them. Instead, she decided to pursue a marketing degree. As part of her studies, she had to complete a thesis, and Megan chose the topic of affordable cat health care. This led to volunteer at The Cat House, Lincoln's only no-kill shelter, to pursue what she intended as only a two-to-three-month project. Megan still helps at The Cat House, along with her husband.

Volunteering has become a normal part of my life just the same as when it started as a requirement for school.

As a cat-rescuer, Megan appreciates the support of The Cat House. "While they can't take every cat, they do help a lot." Many of the cats that have come in to Megan's life have ended up going to The Cat House. In addition, Megan has learned the policies and procedures of The Cat House, and follows them when she and her husband personally rehome cat.

Megan also feels grateful for the support of her husband, Matt, who shares a huge part of the rescue responsibilities. She shared that, "The Cat House will call upon

him for some very interesting 'rescue adventures,' and told of one time when a mother cat had her litter hidden in a pillar of an old house. No one knew how to get them out. Megan and Matt reached a few, but couldn't get to the rest. Matt came up with the creative idea of using tongs to scruff the rest of the kittens and pull them out to safety. "Another odd rescue Matt did on his own was when the Cat House called him and told him one of the cats got loose in the studio of a local TV station when interviewing some volunteers. They had been there for hours trying to catch that cat but Matt wrangled the cat up within 30 minutes."

Like Megan and her husband, I feel a special tug at my heart for homeless animals, and so this is where I particularly wanted to pick Megan's brain. If I were to continue in the world of cat rescue, what might lay ahead for me?

My fosters are considered my pets until they have a new home and we don't cut any corners when it comes to my cats or my foster cats.

Cat rescue is not for the faint-of-heart. There's a lot of responsibility involved. When Megan and her husband take in a cat, they accept that it's now their duty to feed, pay for veterinarian care, and find a home for the cat.

One of the major challenges, Megan acknowledges, is rehoming. "Because I'm not a registered rescue organization, I must utilize my own resources for finding a home. Sometimes we have had foster cats for up to a year or more. Obviously, veterinarian costs are a challenge too. We've spent thousands and thousands of dollars on vet bills for foster cats."

How does Megan find homes for all the cats who come her way? Through networking. She's used her contacts through Facebook, friends, family, and work. "I've some great friends in my life that are like-minded when it comes to animals." As for bills, Megan draws on her marketing skills to do fundraisers for some of the cost.

One last challenge is letting them go. It's wonderful when a once homeless cat finds a forever home, but I'll be the first to say it isn't easy to watch them leave. Just because they're a foster, doesn't mean we don't fall in love.

Megan has grown since her earliest days of rescue. She's learned a lot about cat behavior and health, and she's passed that knowledge onto other cat owners.

## Lincoln Animal Ambassadors raises \$8,000 at 4th Annual Spay-ghetti and No Balls

130 people attended Lincoln Animal Ambassador's annual Spay-ghetti and No Balls fundraiser on the evening of Saturday, March 25, at the Unitarian Church, raising nearly 8,000 for our spay/neuter program.

For \$25, attendees received a dinner that included salad, spaghetti and sauce, and breadsticks. Meatballs were an optional additional cost. Hostesses sent tables one at a time to the buffet line. The all-volunteer wait staff kept everyone's water and tea glasses filled; wine was available for purchase. Energy ran high, with much conversation and laughter throughout the room.

President Mary Douglas took the stage following the meal to thank guests for their support. Lincoln Animal Ambassadors has provided almost 2,700 spay/neuter procedures since its start in 2008, and distributes 3,000 pounds of pet food each month to clients through its pet food bank.

The event's featured organization was Second Chance Pups, which pairs inmates at the Nebraska State Penitentiary with unwanted dogs in need of training. The group was represented at the event by its president and lead trainer, assistant trainers, and graduates of the program.

Melissa Ripley, the organization's adoption coordinator, gave an overview of the program. Selected inmates work together with a professional trainer, prison staff, and volunteers for a nine-week rotation to provide dogs with basic obedience training, socialization, behavior modification, grooming, and daily one-on-one attention. Over 220 inmates have participated, and about 350 dogs have found homes since the program began in 2004.

The event culminated with the very popular dessert auction. About 22 cakes, pies, and/or cookies were up for auction. Auctioneer, Tom Bassett, ran the auction. Bidding was tense, with winning bids ranging from \$35 to \$280. At the end of the evening, two lucky ticket holders each won a basket of pets' supplies donated by Nature's Variety.

An enormous shout out to all who supported Lincoln Animal Ambassadors by coming to Spay-ghetti and No Balls. Special thanks also goes to the 22 businesses who donated food and desserts, more than 24 organizations that sponsored tables, and approximately 30 volunteers who ensured the event ran smoothly. You help save lives every single day!



# Do I Want To Volunteer? Why?

Have you been looking for a way to make a difference in your community? Help others? Get involved with a cause that you care about? Or maybe just be productive? More importantly, volunteering for LAA allows you to be a very important part of how our organization works. We are all volunteers, from all walks of life, with many different skill sets. You can use your skills in a productive way...or even learn some new skills! Some of us are in the work force, but many of us are retired and

looking for something meaningful to commit our time to. A cause we can get behind, that we believe in. Or some of us want to explore new areas of interest, expand our horizons or have conversations with new people.

LAA volunteer, Donna says "Taking my phone shift is a very real way to be part of my community, to help those in need. It is satisfying to know we are helping Lincoln's at-risk pets and their people. Pets are a very important part of so many people's lives, mine included, and I can't imagine having to give them up if I became unable to afford to feed them. Being an LAA volunteer helps me feel like I have a vested interest in LAA's success. I know that what I do is necessary and without us – volunteers – pets and their people would not get the help they need."

Volunteering can take anywhere from 30 minutes to a couple hours each week, depending on the position. We do ask volunteers to commit to an extended period of time when they come on board. Training is provided as well as assistance and continuous support.

"I volunteer for pets who cannot care for themselves. They rely on their owners and sometimes their owners have to rely on us. It makes me feel good to know that as a volunteer, the call I took, will result in a pet getting altered or will not be hungry. There is no greater love than the unconditional love from a pet. To help them makes me smile inside. I know that is corny, but so true" says LAA volunteer, Skeeter.

We are all in this together! Consider volunteering for LAA if for no other reason than to feel better about yourself!

She's also become an advocate of spay/neuter. "There are many people who spend endless hours trying to find homeless animals homes just to turn around and see another 10 that need homes. There are many organizations such as Lincoln Animal Ambassadors that can assist with costs of spay/neuter or offer a pet food bank." Megan believes that if more people were educated on animal welfare, it might make a difference..

One of my favorite podcasts, Community

Cats, emphasizes that animal rescue starts with a series of tiny steps. In its introductory segment, hostess Stacey LeBaron says that she rescued one cat when she was a child, then adopted several cats with her husband, eventually volunteered as a secretary for a local rescue, which led to her work with the highly successful Merrimack River Feline Rescue. It's easy to feel intimidated by all that animal rescuers achieve, but Megan is one local example that shows rescue can truly start with just one cat.
