Why? Lincoln Animal
Ambassador's Low-cost
Spay/Neuter Program is
dependent on donations,
grants, and volunteers. In
2010, when LAA's program
was initiated, a promise was
made to the veterinarian
clinics agreeing to work

with the program that no voucher would be issued without money to cover it. For many unpreventable, unforeseen reasons this past spring and summer LAA had a huge influx of requests and almost ran out of money to cover vouchers. So issuing vouchers had to be restricted.

The slowdown in issuing vouchers did not mean the number of cats and dogs needing spay and neutering assistance slowed down. The result: a very long wait list of Lincoln citizens, trying to do the right thing, still needing assistance altering their pets.

Since June 2010, LAA has assisted with altering 1,275 pets belonging to local citizens. The number of unwanted litters of kittens and puppies prevented is in the millions but that is not enough with the number of pets placed with local rescue groups and shelters for adoption. Yes, something more needs to be done. We must persevere! One at a time. That One could be you!

Good news! The amount of positive accomplished by One is infinite. The "ripples" of litters caused by one unaltered cat or dog

are stopped. Far-reaching ripples will result from the good done by one person doing one or both of the two things below:

- 1. Donate money. One donation of \$20 can assist with getting a male cat or dog neutered, thus preventing all the litters one male can produce in his lifetime. Every donation, no matter if it is \$1 or \$1,000 is put to good use. LAA is an organization which is comprised of volunteers doing the work in their homes; therefore, overhead is only what is absolutely necessary.
- 2. Donate time. One hour of volunteer time equals three to four LAA's clients interviewed to receive a spay/neuter voucher. For those unable to donate money, volunteering is an excellent way to help. Volunteering for LAA is also a great way to "help animals" for those who feel they can't handle the realities of doing hands-on rescue work.

Fortunately, right now vouchers are being issued full speed ahead, but LAA does not ever want to experience another slowdown. You, as a member

of our community, are counted on to help with the mission to prevent homeless pets in Lincoln. LAA will not be satisfied until there are no more homeless pets.

Featured Rescue: R.u.F.F. Rescue, Inc.

R.u.F.F. Rescue. Inc. emerged from the desire of several community individuals that saw the need in Lincoln and its' surrounding area to provide a rescue for small dogs, 25# and under. We became licensed with the state and incorporated in March 2012, and then obtained our non profit 501 c 3 status shortly after. The current working board has more than 50 years combined experience of animal rescue. We do not have a shelter or facility to provide housing for our rescue dogs, instead, we rely on volunteers to provide a loving environment within their family homes. Our volunteers have a career, families, pets and busy life style, yet find the time to provide that extra touch and love that is so much needed for our rescue dogs. To our delight and surprise, we celebrated our first year as a rescue, knowing that we facilitated 41 dogs being adopted into their furever families.

The dogs that come into our care with R.u.F.F. Rescue, have arrived with a variety of life experiences: animal shelters, owners

that are no longer able to care for their dogs, rural community vets, special need dogs, puppy mills or commercial breeding facilities, and yes, those strays, that have landed at our volunteers' doorstep. After an assessment and vet needs completed, rescue dogs are placed in a loving foster home waiting for their furever family to adopt.

Funding is always an issue within small nonprofit organizations. R.u.F.F. Rescue started out with seed money from a one-time donation generously given by one local non dog related business. The rescue currently operates on a small budget of donations for dog adoptions. Community vets are utilized for the needs of our rescue dogs. Discounts of services and supplies are always welcomed for the continued survival of our rescue.

Volunteers are always needed and welcomed in R.u.F.F. Rescue. Some individuals may think fostering is the only volunteer opportunity available, not true, if you are unable to foster with our organization, please consider other opportunities to help: sponsor a rescue dog, transportation of rescue dogs, volunteer to

host or coordinate fundraisers, post on your personal FaceBook page our rescue dogs looking for their furever home–social media is fantastic for getting the word out of our rescue needs. Can you sew? ... make items for the dogs or a fundraiser. Other options may include financial donations, gift cards to Menards or Tractor Supply, or check with one of the volunteers as to what may be needed within the rescue at that time. The ideas are endless for volunteering with our small dog rescue organization.

Fostering a rescue dog starts by completing a volunteer application on line via our website: ruff-rescue.com. Foster training and ongoing support is available to all foster families. Food and other supplies are provided for your foster dog. We monitor our rescue dogs food intake, as we believe diet is essential to the overall good health of our rescue dogs. We encourage our foster parents to share input with the adoptive family, as they have gained a great deal of knowledge of their foster dog.



R.u.F.F. Rescue volunteers attend numerous events in Lincoln and surrounding areas to share our rescue dogs and educate the public on rescue dog needs. We offer specialized training to our volunteers as well as the community on topics of rescues, foster parenting and dog training assistance. We have several speakers within the rescue that offer public speaking to educate the public on rescues, rescue dogs and their needs, or other topics.

Why adopt a senior pet?

Every year thousands upon thousands of "senior" animals sit helplessly by in shelter cages as families charmed by playful puppies and boisterous kittens take the youngest animals available home with them. Senior pets five years and older are among the most difficult for shelters to find homes for. Future pet parents may assume these senior animals are past their prime, have little energy, or may come with ingrained bad habits. However, nothing could be further from the truth. In fact, there are several advantages to choosing a senior animal over a kitten or puppy.

• WYSIWYG: What You See Is What You Get. Senior animals have fully developed personalities and body sizes. They will not grow larger or acquire different personalities in 6 months to a year. A kitten or puppy may turn out to be completely different in middle age than it appeared when it was adopted, but a senior pet's personality is well established.

- MANNERS & HABITS: Older pets do not need to be housetrained or introduced to human house manners and habits. Older dogs may have received previous obedience training and older cats are already socialized and used to human interaction. They are less likely to destroy furniture and create havoc during play.
- SCHEDULES. Older pets are more likely to sleep through the night and are less demanding of attention from their owner's time during the day since they have lesser need for play.
- TRUE RESCUES. Senior pets are truly in danger at most animal shelters since they are more difficult to place and are most likely to be passed up by potential adopters. Thus, by adopting a senior pet, you will be truly saving a life.

Beyond being a vet:

Career opportunities for animal lovers

All of us have heard something similar to this statement: "My son/daughter/grandson/grandaughter loves animals and thinks they want to be a veterinarian." When I hear these words my initial thought is usually something like: Great, this world can never have enough animal lovers. And then it quickly turns to: There are so many ways to have a career helping animals besides just being a vet and I want people to realize this simple truth.

I was once an employee at one of the largest humane societies in the United States with close to 140 employees, only three of which were veterinarians! My point is that any child or teen should be encouraged to pursue a career that utilizes their strengths and interests. Let me show

you what I mean. The chart below provides a list of opportunities. The left hand column list some interests and special skills you may see in a young person who is an animal lover and the right hand column give examples of how they can be used to help animals at a humane society.

All 140 employees made that humane society great. It is a reality that not every young person has the intellectual ability to be a veterinarian or will want to go to college for eighth years What is a reality is that everyone has skills and interests that can be utilized to help companion animals. So the next time you hear that common proclamation, please encourage that youngster to pursue other options in animal rescue that are just as important to caring for animals and saving lives.
