Featured Rescue: **Beatrice Humane Society**

Beatrice Humane Society, Inc. is a NO-kill shelter serving Beatrice, Dewitt and Gage County.

The shelter's mission is: "To shelter, protect and place lost and homeless companion animals in Gage County and to be an educational resource to the community."

The shelter's vision is: "We envision a community that embraces companion animals with compassion. This includes protecting animals, promoting responsible pet ownership and educating the public."

Beatrice Humane Society opened in 1999, and after dealing with many inadequacies of an old building, the shelter moved into a new building in May 2017. One feature of the new building are the isolation rooms in the event of sick animals, along with a negative air flow system aimed at keeping illness from spreading among cats in the shelter. It involves a system of kennels, slats and pipes where air is pulled by a fan through the individual holding pens and then out of the building. The new building also provides a conference room where educational opportunities are provided for the community. The Beatrice Humane Society handles 800-900 animals per year.

The shelter provides a Foster Care Program through which families provide temporary homes for animals that are not yet ready for adoption. Through this program, several animals are able to have a second chance to find their forever homes.

This past fall, Beatrice Humane Society was able to rescue pets from the Hurricane Harvey-battered Texas Gulf. Beatrice Humane Society shelter manager Bryce Caulk said 12 dogs and a ferret were brought up from the north Houston and Corpus Christi areas after the shelter reached out and offered to help.

Volunteer Spotlight: **Allison Hunter-Frederick**

Where did you first learn about Lincoln Animal Ambassadors?

I met Mary Douglas when we were both doing volunteer work at Hearts United for Animals. She'd been asking me for a long time to write for Lincoln Animal Ambassadors. When I married and moved to Lincoln in 2008, I started looking for animal welfare groups to volunteer with. I wanted to find an organization that could use my writing skills, and LAA was it.

Tell us a little bit about yourself.

I'm an administrative assistant and a writer. My husband works as a website and database developer at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. He supports my volunteer activities as my editor and sometimes photographer. We have a dog and three cats. Our dog recently retired from agility competitions after earning his championship titles in both TDAA and AKC. Our youngest cat is a therapy cat. When I'm not working or volunteering, I spend time with family and friends, train my pets, attend church, network with other cat lovers, and read.

What areas do you primarily volunteer for us at this time?

I serve as the Media Chair for Lincoln Animal Ambassadors. In this role, I'm responsible for submitting events to calendars, scheduling promotional media spots, and writing monthly news releases. My largest duty is coordinating our blog, which consists of writing articles, answering comments, and lining up guest bloggers. This past year, I also began posting cat advice columns and cat training videos.

What do you find rewarding in your volunteer activities?

I started out with Lincoln Animal Ambassadors simply wanting to use my creative skills to help animals. As I became more comfortable in my role as a blogger, I've enjoyed getting to know others who have a passion for animals. They've increased my awareness of all the many needs of animals but also of all the many available resources. I'm proud of LAA's goal to stop animal homelessness before it starts.

Do you do other volunteer work in Lincoln? As an extension of my educational writing efforts with Lincoln Animal Ambassadors, I

write for Lincoln Kids and Lincoln 55+. I recently

resigned as a caretaker and volunteer coordinator with Husker Cats to have more time for other ventures. I host two small groups, Lincoln Children's Writers and Lincoln Cat Friends. The latter meets to socialize and learn about indoor cat enrichment. My husband and I will start fostering through The Cat House this spring. I also visit The Cat House to spend time with its cats. My youngest cat and I are a therapy cat team and visit senior residences. We just completed our ten supervised visits needed to get certified through Love on a Leash. This summer we'll enroll in the R.E.A.D. program so that we can visit students too.

What would you recommend to anyone looking to volunteer for Lincoln Animal Ambassadors?

Lincoln Animal Ambassadors has many volunteer opportunities and the hours are flexible. We can use telephone interviewers, pet food bank and newsletter distributors, information table hosts, and more.

Volunteering with LAA is a terrific way to help both people and animals.

If you could add one thing to the Lincoln Animal Ambassadors "wish list," what would it be?

Volunteers are the heartbeat of any organization. My wish for Lincoln Animal Ambassadors is more volunteers, as this would allow us to reach more pet owners with spay/neuter, pet food bank, and education. A few grants wouldn't hurt either as this would also help us expand our offerings.

When your dog house soils

If your house-trained dog starts having accidents, there are two measures to take. The first is medical and the second is behavioral. Both are covered below.

MEDICAL CAUSES

If your adult potty-trained dog has started to house-soil again, Dr. Madison advised waiting 72 hours before taking her to a vet, unless the pee has a foul odor, looks cloudy, or contains blood. Dr. Walton noted that a change in your dog's stools—such as in texture, color, or consistency—would also be a reason not to delay a visit to the vet. As would a change in bathroom habits combined with weight loss, increased thirst, or other signs of illness such as vomiting, diarrhea, lethargy, or loss of appetite.

When I talked with local vets, Dr. Madison listed urinary infections and diabetes as two common medical reasons for a trained dog to house-soil. Dr. Walton concurred, and expanded the list: Excessive peeing could indicate bladder stones or bladder cancer, Cushing's disease, or cognitive dysfunction; pooping indoors might indicate gastrointestinal tract disease.

Vet Street provides this complete list of reasons for a dog's change in bathroom habits:

- · Side effects of medications
- Hormone incontinence
- Age-related diseases
- Other health problems: Infections, tumors, spinal cord injuries, or bladder problems can cause incontinence in dogs of any age

BEHAVIORAL CAUSES

Some behavioral changes that could effect a dog to start pottying inside would be any change to the home or family, sudden fear or anxiety from any number of things, or it may just be acting out due to not getting what it wants. —Dr. Erica Madison, Vintage Heights

Anxiety, lack of consistent schedule, being crated or kept indoors too long (owners have long work hours), and lack of exercise are all behavioral reasons for a dog to potty inside. —Dr. Amy Walton, Pet Care Center of Lincoln

Submissive Urination: Does your dog pee when you come home or when he meets new people? Chances are he suffers from submissive urination and has little control over his bladder. Even if your dog licks your face and wags his tail, your dog can also urinate because he believes this is a way to show submission. Other signs of submission include avoidance of eye contact, ears back, retraction of lips, and cowering. Submissive urination is most prevalent in puppies and young female dogs. It happens when a person approaches, reaches out, or stands over a dog. To help your dog overcome submissive urination, kneel at your dog's level when you greet him, avoiding eye contact, and never touching him on the head or ears. You might also throw a few treats in front of him when he greets you.

Excitement: Does your dog pee when being greeted, receiving affection, or from otherwise being excited? Just like with submissive urination, he'll have little control over his bladder. In fact. excitement urination most often occurs among young dogs, and usually resolves on its own as a dog matures. To help the process, Dr. Sophia Yin suggests reducing his excitement. When family and friends come to visit, instead of instantly petting and playing with your dog, they should ignore him until he has calmed down. Even then, pet with slow and even strokes and speak softly and soothingly. If at this point your dog still urinates, he should again be ignored until he is once again placid.

Fear: Does the sound of loud noises from traffic, construction, or storms cause your dog to refuse to relieve himself outside? Conditions outside are making your dog anxious and unable to use the bathroom and the unfortunate result could be that he'll later have an accident in the house. If the noise is temporary, VetStreet suggests taking your dog somewhere else such as for a walk or to doggy daycare. If the noise is consistent, use this opportunity to use distractions and rewards to condition him to not react negatively, and in time he should learn to accept noises as a normal part of life. Alternatively, try creating a relaxing environment in the house with the use of music and puzzle feeders.

Changes in Routine: Have there been any recent changes in your family's life? Changes such as a birth or death, a family member moving out or into the home, or divorce can cause distress in a dog. As can the remodeling of your house or a deviation in the family's daily routine. In his anxiety, your dog may become

nervous and have accidents in the house. During the transition period your dog may struggle to cope and so you should allow your dog time to adjust.

Separation Anxiety: Does your dog act distressed and relieve himself when left alone? Your dog may be suffering from separation anxiety. He isn't being bad out of spite or revenge, but because he's missing you. Separation anxiety is a behavior that might require the assistance of a veterinarian or a behavior specialist, and it can take weeks or even months to change.

Marking: Is your dog urinating on vertical surfaces? Chances are he's marking his territory. Marking is a normal territorial behavior, whereby a dog stakes his claim on property. Dogs mark for numerous reasons including male hormonal influences, the introduction of a baby or new dog, renovations to the house or a move into a new house, and general stress. PetMD advises that you spay/neuter your dog as soon as it's old enough.

If a dog potties inside due to anxiety-related reasons, renew training, increase exercise, and consider anxiety medication. Note about medications: they don't fix the problem. They simply bring the dog to a level that they'll be receptive to training and not in a panic. Proper, consistent training is key. —Dr. Amy Walton, Pet Care Center of Lincoln

Regardless of which behavior is causing your dog to house-soil, Dr. Madison says that if all else fails you may have retrain him all over again. "Put the dog on a leash as soon as it comes in and walk through the house and then go right back outside. Usually there are too many distractions outside and they forget why they are outside, so they come in the house, take a deep breath, and pee."

CONCLUSION

Your dog is not having accidents to punish you. First, determine the cause is medical. If it's not, then they may simply lack the proper training, or they're stressed. In either case, they need your help. With time and patience, your home can once again be a clean and cheerful one.
